Dal dates back to 1818, when the ninth earl of Dalhousie, then the governor of Nova Scotia, used funds collected during the War of 1812 to open a college that could be attended by any person from any class. Today it is the largest university in the Maritimes. The main campus is in the heart of Halifax's historic South End; two downtown campuses are adjacent to Spring Garden Road, with its many pubs, cafés and restaurants. In 2012, the Nova Scotia Agricultural College near Truro, N.S., 80 km north, merged with Dal, creating a new faculty of agriculture. Halifax gets about 120 days of fog a year, but the main campus—a mix of vine-covered stone buildings and contemporary architecture—is warm and welcoming. Authors Lucy Maud Montgomery and Hugh MacLennan graduated from Dal, as did CBC news anchor Ian Hanomansing and cabinet minister Peter MacKay. "We have nearly two centuries of academic excellence in this wonderful community by the sea," says Dalhousie's new president, Richard Florizone, who adds that the university plans to build on more than 250 partnerships with industry, government and communities.



## STANDOUT PROGRAMS

- **Ocean Sciences:** B.Sc. students learn about oceanography, marine chemistry, marine geology and biology, just steps away from the Atlantic Ocean.
- **International Development Studies:** Undergrads learn about poverty, social change, rural development, migration, health, indigenous peoples and global citizenship in the interdisciplinary program. Students can work in Cuba and Uganda through an internship funded by the Canadian International Development Agency.
- **Bachelor of Management:** The first two years are dedicated to core courses in accounting, marketing, environ-

mental management, government structure and knowledge management. In upper years, students specialize

## COOL COURSES

- **Food Activism:** Students explore food movements and alternative food practices and discuss key characteristics and critiques of the food system. They look at case studies of cultural practices and food activism from around the world that challenge or provide alternatives to the current food system.
- **Starting Lean:** This management course provides hands-on experience in starting a small company. Students work in teams to develop products, starting by speaking to real potential customers about their needs.
